I love to find free things. I want to make sure you are aware of a valuable resource and yes, it's free. That is the **NRA Hunter Education** Online Course. It is applicable to all ages and is free to students under 18.

"The NRA online Hunter Education course for Oregon is free to everyone. Students under 18 receive a Field Day Qualifier Certificate and will be required to attend a Field day to complete their Hunter Education. Students over 18 are required to pay the state of Oregon \$10 to receive a Hunter Education Certificate which the NRA collects on their behalf (100% of this fee is returned to the state)."

As with any of our students who have taken any of the

available online courses, the student presents their certificate to you and must take the field day as well as pass our exam in order to obtain an Oregon Hunter Education Card. We also require them to attend one day /evening of our traditional class so that they get the review and we can make sure they know everything our traditional students have been taught.

I encourage you that when you have students that just can't match their busy schedules to your traditional classes, this NRA course

should be a good alternative to part of your class. Of course they still have to pay the \$10 to ODFW for our part in it.



SPORTSMEN BE "TICK" AWARE

Unlike the winter of 2016-17, the winter of 2017-18 was relatively mild and uneventful which equals an early and abundant tick season in Oregon. People have been calling me about ticks after finding

them on themselves, children and pets. I have been out doing surveillance work collecting ticks for the Oregon Health Authority and have had no problem finding them in my traps and on myself.

My colleague in Jackson County has been collecting ticks since February and has already isolated Lyme disease *Borrellia burgdorferi* in the tick *lxodes pacificus* better known as the Western Black-Legged Tick or deer tick in that region. This species of tick is present in Western Oregon and along the Columbia River in lower elevations. It is believed that one to five percent of the Western Black-Legged Ticks actually carry the bacterium responsible for Lyme disease.

Here on the east side of Oregon we predominately have *Dermacentor variabilis* better known as the American Dog Tick which can transmit Rocky Mountain Spotted-Fever and Tularemia. They prefer to feed on dogs, rodents and other large animals, but will definitely find their way to a human host. Another rather nasty tick found in Eastern Oregon is the *Dermacenter andersoni* better known as the Rocky Mountain Wood Tick. This tick can transmit Rocky Mountain Spotted-Fever, Colorado Tick Fever, Tick Relapsing Fever and Tularemia. Another rather nasty condition that these ticks can cause is Tick Paralysis where the host will actually "go down" and be paralyzed after this species of tick embeds itself into its host. It is vital that the tick be removed soon after this symptom happens or death could occur. If the tick is removed the host will generally recover within 24 to 72 hours.

The main way to not have a tick encounter is to avoid them. That is not an option for most of us as outdoor enthusiasts. Remember that ticks in Oregon are active primarily in the spring and summer, but also can be found in the fall. Bear and Turkey hunters can come in contact with "seed" ticks which are virtually impossible to see unless you have a magnifying glass. Check yourself for ticks more than once, these ticks in the "seed" nymph stage can even embed themselves between you eyelashes and can go unnoticed. Deer hunters will most definitely find ticks on their recently harvested game. Beware after the animal has expired, the ticks will leave that host to seek another more suitable "live" host which will probably be you!

Things to remember when afield in tick country: Be careful when walking in thick vegetation, ticks usually "crest" on the uphill side of a trail, wear a heavy duty repellant with DEET as the active ingredient and tuck your pant legs inside of your boots and wear a hat.

While inspecting yourself for ticks what should you do if you find an embedded tick? If possible have someone else remove the tick from your body, use tweezers or forceps rather than fingers (I prefer the really pointed tipped ones), grasp the mouth parts or head of the tick as close to the skin as possible, gently pull the tick straight out, steadily and firmly. The mouth parts of a tick are barbed, so don't be alarmed if a little bit of it breaks off into your skin. Always wash your hands and use an antiseptic to the bite area.

As a precaution, if you experience any of these symptoms after a tick bite like fever, headaches, fatigue, joint pain or an unusual halo ring or red rash on your skin seek medical attention immediately. Remember, heading out into tick country doesn't have to be scary, just use good precautionary measures and common sense when going afield.

Other improvements to our processes will be getting this newsletter to you, the mem-

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

As you know, planning and preparation is equally vital for hunter education activities. Instructors across our tri-county region (Crook, Deschutes, and Jefferson) have

been busy since January doing just that. Both independent study and conventional courses have been completed, with more on tap. So far in our tri-county area Deschutes is the only county that has used the newly revised test. Initial impressions from instructors are favorable, and that the revisions have improved the test.

Changing to an associated topic, on May 19, some 28 instructors attended the OD-FW's Regional Instructor conference in Redmond. In addition to ODFW program updates, there were two presentations that really stood out for me. The first was the tribute given to Gary Soules, and his many contributions to the hunter education

I won't be converting to copper for shooting at the range, or in my 22-when hunting small game, but I do plan on using it for big game if I am successful getting a tag.

Some additional items and activities of interest. Kevin Borst (Bend instructor), along with other instructors, the Bend OHA, and ODFW have been busy planning and preparing for their 8th annual Out-door Youth and Family Day that is held between Bend and Sisters on June 2. This is a great family friendly event that Kevin has been





instrumental in developing and offering to the public.

The Redmond Rod and Gun Club, who OHEIA blessed with a grant last year, has a full slate of planned youth shooting events in addition to our regular hunter education days. The NRA's YHEC and Oregon High

School Rodeo State events will both be occurring in June. Some 4H and Scouting shooting activities already occurred, with more planned. The OHEIA grant the range received
