## FROM THE KITCHEN OF YOUR NORTHEAST DIRECTOR

## **Dove Jalapeño Poppers**

You can make up as many as you like with this recipe. The best doves can be hunted at the Ladd Marsh Wildlife Refuge in La Grande, but feel free to harvest your doves wherever you can!

## Ingredients

Buttermilk
Deboned Dove breasts
Jalapeño peppers
Cream cheese
Raw bacon
Seasoning of choice



Soak the deboned breast meat in buttermilk overnight.

Remove from marinade and pat dry.

Cut jalapeño peppers in half the long way, and scoop out the seeds. Wear gloves or wash your hands after.

Fill each pepper with cream cheese.

Top each with a Dove breast and season it with your favorite seasoning blend.

Next wrap the whole thing with a slice of bacon and secure it with a toothpick. You can even sprinkle the bacon with a little brown sugar if you like.

After your Poppers are prepped, you can throw them on the smoker, cook them in the oven, or use the air fryer. Just make sure the bacon is crispy and the doves are completely cooked to an internal temperature of 165 degrees.

## NEWS FROM YOUR EASTERN DIRECTOR -- By Lanny Fujishin, Eastern Director

## Big Opportunities for Young Hunters

Tucked up along Brownlee Reservoir, just south of Richland, Oregon, is one of the best kept secrets for young hunters in the state of Oregon. Idaho Power's 11,000-acre Daly Creek Habitat Mitigation Area (HMA) extends from the lower elevation Eagle Valley up to 5800 feet in elevation in the Lookout Mountain Unit (Unit 64). Deer populations with mature bucks and herds of over 300 elk are common on the landscape.

Youth hunters can apply for access on over 11,000 acres of Idaho Power's Daly Creek HMA to hunt elk, deer, and game birds. New for 2024 are access permits for Spring Turkey. The youth must have a valid tag for the season(s) in which they are applying for access and be between 12 to 17 years old at the time of the hunt. They also must have their Hunter Education Certification. They must be accompanied by an adult age 21 or older who may not hunt, with the exception of the game bird access, excluding Spring Turkey. Youth may apply by going to <a href="https://idahopower.com/community-recreation/recreation/fishing-and-hunting/daly-creek-youth-hunt/">https://idahopower.com/community-recreation/recreation/fishing-and-hunting/daly-creek-youth-hunt/</a> and submitting an application before the postmark deadline dates of April 1 for spring turkey, July 1 for archery season access or the early 264T access, or August 1 for rifle season or upland game bird access. Access permits have been limited to six for archery elk; and three for archery deer, rifle deer, and most rifle elk seasons. More access permits are available for the antlerless elk seasons with a total of 22 access permits allocated for those four hunts. Access permits are free of charge.

Access permit drawings are held at the Hitching Post Grocery in Richland, Oregon and are live-streamed on their Facebook page.

Success rates are generally low for bow hunters primarily due to the challenge of stalking in open country, but rifle hunters usually have above average success rates. Six archery elk hunters hunted on Daly Creek HMA during the season with one harvesting a 6x6 bull. The rifle buck deer hunters harvested one mature buck on Daly Creek HMA. Nine first, second, and third-season, one-elk tag holders harvested one 6x6, one 6x5, one 5x5, one 4x5, and one antlerless elk in 2023. Eight of the eleven hunters with antlerless elk tags harvested antlerless elk.

The Daly Creek HMA was created when Idaho Power (IPC) purchased the 10,212-acre Daly Creek Ranch in December 2005 in anticipation of fulfilling relicensing requirements with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for IPC's Hells Canyon Complex.

The Daly Creek HMA is managed with the principal goal of protecting and enhancing the integrity of natural resources and their values. The focus is to enhance upland and riparian habitats for wildlife, especially targeting wintering big game and wintering wildlife. The HMA is managed to provide multiple public uses if compatible with wildlife habitat management objectives.

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## Country Cabbage Soup

Recipe by my late friends Jack and Helen Robson

1 lb. Italian-style ground pork sausage, or hamburger, stew meat, elk, or venison (Dealers Choice)

½ lb. beer sausage, sliced and quartered

2 cans Italian or Cajun-style stewed tomatoes

2 cans beef broth

1 pkg onion soup mix

2 tbsp dark brown sugar

2 tbsp apple cider vinegar

2 tbsp lemon juice

2 dashes Tabasco sauce

1 head cabbage chopped.

1 turnip, cubed.

1 rutabaga, cubed.

1 cup beets, diced.

1 cup fresh corn, or 1 can cream style corn.

1 cup asparagus, chopped.

1 loaf French bread, hard crusted.

In a large Dutch oven pot, brown the sausages and meat together. Add to the meat, the tomatoes, broth, soup mix, sugar, vinegar, lemon juice, Tabasco sauce, cabbage, turnip, rutabaga, beets, corn, and asparagus. Season the way you like it! Bring to a boil, reduce heat. Cover and simmer for 2 hours. Serve with French bread and butter. Makes one heck of a meal. Enjoy!

# TURKEY SEASON IS COMING

# How to Cook Wild Turkey Thighs & Legs for Shredded Meat

- 1. Use skinless wild turkey thighs and legs.
- 2. Pat dry and remove as much silver skin as you can. A little bit left on is fine.
- 3. Cut out as many surface leg tendons as you can.
- 4. Season liberally with your favorite poultry seasoning.
- 5. Fit turkey thighs and legs into a slow cooker.
- 6. Cover your turkey thighs and legs in the slow cooker with chicken broth or chicken bouillon mixture.
- 7. Add one large diced sweet onion into the slow cooker.
- 8. Cover the slow cooker with the lid and cook on High for 8-10 hours. Until meat falls off the bone.



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9. Remove the meat and onions from slow cooker and set aside. Start removing the bones, tendons, and any other pieces from the meat and the broth. Save the broth for something else, like a good soup.

Now, shred all your beautiful turkey meat. You can make anything with the shredded meat at this point. Sandwiches, tacos, enchiladas, etc.

#### HERE IS ONE SANDWICH OPTION:

Put your shredded turkey meat back into an empty slow cooker on High.

Add a good amount of your favorite barbecue sauce and mix. Let it warm up for approx. 20-30 minutes. I like Sweet Baby Ray's Barbecue Sauce. Make it as saucy or not, just as you like.

Get your favorite bun, roll, sub-roll, slider roll, and toast or grille it. Add some sauce on your bread and then add that warm saucy shredded turkey meat. Brioche bun works well.
